Connie began her career in education in 1979 when she graduated from Moorhead
State University with an MA in School Psychology. It was on the rural roads of
northern Minnesota, traveling to 11 different school districts and seeing the effects
of deep poverty, she gained her greatest appreciation for the importance of public
education in the lives of students and communities. Eventually her interest in school
organizational development took her back to Mankato State University to become
qualified as a superintendent so she could lead from the lens of recruiting and
supporting the very best teachers for the classroom. Her work as a superintendent
has spanned 18 years and four school districts across Minnesota. Coming to
Northeast Metro 916 Intermediate School District in 2006 felt somewhat like
returning to her roots at the very beginning of her career where meeting the needs
of special needs children is one of several services provided to the 14 member
school districts.

Dan Hoverman, Former Superintendent, Mounds View Public Schools Public Schools Dan Hoverman's career with Mounds View Public Schools spanned 41 years of management experience at all school levels. In 2007, the School Board named him Superintendent. During his tenure Hoverman championed a variety of efforts to enhance the personalization of public school education through innovation and data-driven decision-making that allowed Mounds View to consistently rank among the Top 10 highest-performing districts in the state. As Superintendent, Hoverman launched a comprehensive effort aimed at post-secondary success for all students, including an Equity Promise that all students will be prepared for success after high school regardless of race, class or disability. Part of this initiative was Mounds View's award-winning, first-of-its-kind Early College program that allows students

in the academic middle the opportunity to earn an associate degree on campus for free. Hoverman also spearheaded an effort that enabled all district juniors to take the ACT exam onsite and free of charge. The District also has provided every middle and high school student with an online Personal Learning Plan. Hoverman retired from Mounds View Public Schools in 2016.

• Dr. Teri Staloch, Superintendent, Prior Lake-Savage Area Schools

Dr. Teri Staloch is the Superintendent of Prior Lake-Savage Area Schools, a suburban school district in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area. Her work has encompassed a wide range of teaching and instructional leadership from elementary school through post-secondary education. Dr. Staloch began serving as Superintendent of PLSAS in July 2015. Prior to assuming the position in Prior Lake-Savage, she served as the Assistant Superintendent for Osseo Area Schools and also held a position as Director of Curriculum, Instruction and Educational Standards in Osseo. Her professional experience also includes positions in both Minnesota and Wisconsin: Director of Instructional Services and Interim Principal of Holmen Middle School and Ventures Charter School (WI); Principal of Viking Elementary School (WI); Assistant Professor and Interim Director for the School of Education, University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse; and English Teacher at St. Charles Middle/High School (MN). Staloch holds a Ph.D. in Educational Policy and Administration and a M. Ed. Degree in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Minnesota. Peggy Flathmann, Ed. D. is the Superintendent of Fridley Public School District in the Twin Cities area. She has held this position for the past 7 years. Peggy has a BA in English Education from Wartburg College in Waverly, IA, MA in Educational Administration from University of Northern Iowa, and Ed. D. in Educational Leadership from St. Thomas University in St. Paul, MN. With nearly 40 years' experience in education, Dr. Flathmann began her education career as a language arts teacher where she taught in middle and high schools for 9 years. She began her administrative career at Wausau West High School in Wisconsin, first as an assistant principal and then principal. While at Wausau West she was able to assume a variety of roles including assistant principal and high school principal. In 1993, she and her husband Drew and son, Reed, moved to Minnesota as she became the coprincipal of Centennial Junior High School in Circle Pines, Minnesota. In 1996, Dr. Flathmann was asked to help with the building construction and programming for a new Middle School in the Centennial School District. The following year she moved into the new school as its first principal. In 1999, she accepted the position as assistant superintendent for the Centennial School District where she served in that

role for 6 years. In 2005, she accepted a new position as Director of Educational Services for Fridley Public Schools. She began this position as the district started its journey to become a full International Baccalaureate continuum district with all schools at all levels receiving authorization and becoming IB World Schools. In spring 2009, this goal was accomplished and Dr. Flathmann was hired as the Superintendent of Fridley Public Schools in July 2009. Her broad range of experience and collaborative leadership style has been evident as she has moved to new professional challenges. Since 2000 she has taught courses in educational leadership at several universities including the University of St. Thomas, the University of Wisconsin – River Falls, Hamline University, and Bethel University.
