Bloomington	Distance Learning	At its Aug. 17 meeting, the School Board unanimously approved a resolution to begin the 2020-21 school year in Distance Learning 2.0. Distance Learning 2.0 is an instruction plan that allows for fully remote learning with improvements based on staff, parent and student feedback from last spring. This model includes direct teacher instruction and independent student work, with a combination of virtual meetings, interactive class sessions and pre-recorded videos.	Sept. 8	LINK
Brooklyn Center	Distance Learning	BCCS will implement the limited campus hybrid model starting Tuesday, September 8 through at least Friday, October 9. More information about the plan: In the limited campus hybrid model, most students in E-12 (early learning through grade 12) participate in full-time online learning off-campus Students in a setting-three special education program will be the only student group to have the option of on-campus learning All staff will report to the buildings for work and practice social distancing, wear masks and implement other health and safety protocols Campus will be open for students to meet individually or in small groups with staff to receive on-site support. More information about types of appointments and available services will be shared at a later date. Burnsville-Eagan-Savage	Distance Learning / Hybrid	The District 191 Board of Education approved a plan on Aug. 13 for the start of the school year that will slowly build to all grade levels attending school in our Hybrid model. This deliberate and strategic approach will ensure safe and successful implementation of the Hybrid model by prioritizing relationships and allowing students and staff to practice new health and safety routines. Details include: - Delaying instruction by two days to provide more time for professional development. - Starting most students in Distance Learning and moving more grades into Hybrid over the course of September. - Have all students in Hybrid model by Sept. 28. In this design, 50 percent of students would attend school on campus on Monday and Tuesday (group A); the other 50 percent would attend school on campus on Wednesday and Thursday (group B). Friday is a virtual learning day for grades 2-12, which will include live, real-time online connections with teachers. As much as possible, students from the same family will be assigned to the same group.</p> <p>For families that want a full-time online learning environment, Eden Prairie Schools offers EP Online, our K-12 online school. 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Edina	Hybrid	<p>Edina Public Schools is excited to bring students back into schools part time in a hybrid learning model, while also providing an improved online learning experience for students and families who prefer it:</p> <p>A hybrid model of learning is a weekly blend of in-school learning following strict safety guidelines, and at-home learning via technology. In addition, families may choose to have their students participate in full time distance learning in the newly designed Edina Virtual Academy. Through "lessons learned" from last spring, summer focus groups with students, parents and staff, research and professional development, the crisis-mode distance learning model has been improved and promises a more holistic approach to online learning.</p>	Sept. 8	LINK

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Hopkins	Distance Learning	<p>Specific highlights include:</p> <p>While the first day of school will not change, all students will begin their school year with a staggered remote learning approach for 2-4 weeks — we are calling this our #HopkinsStrong Start. K-6 families will be in the #HopkinsStrong Start for a shorter amount of time. More information will be provided soon.</p> <p>Hopkins will offer full-time Distance Learning as a choice for all families for the 2020-21 school year through our Royal Distance Learning Academy.</p> <p>Hopkins will also offer a Hybrid model, which prioritizes maximum in-person learning for our youngest students. K-1 will learn in-person four days a week and grades 2-6 will learn in-person two days a week. It will focus on strong relationships, responsive mental health/social-emotional support, individualized support with tutors/mentors, and engaging and supporting families.</p> <p>Hybrid Considered for Late September: We will consider moving to a hybrid model for K-5 students two days per week beginning September 28, and add additional students in future steps.</p>		LINK



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Intermediate District 917	Hybrid	We plan to begin the school year in a hybrid model. In most of our programs, students will attend face-to-face two days per week and then be in a distance learning model for the remaining days. Students will be divided into two cohorts. There will be an A and a B cohort. In a typical five day week, the A cohort will be face-to-face on Monday and Tuesday and be in distance learning on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The B cohort will be in distance learning on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and be face-to-face on Thursday and Friday. Each building's student populations will be divided into two groups: Group A and Group B Group A will be in the building for In-person Learning on Mondays and Tuesdays while Group B participates in Distance Learning Group B will then be in the building for In-person Learning on Thursdays and Fridays while Group A participates in Distance Learning Both groups will participate in Distance Learning on the Flex Day, Wednesdays, to allow for additional deep cleaning of buildings between groups, time for staff planning and professional development, and a time for staff to check in with and provide additional support to students and families. 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Minnetonka	Hybrid	<p>The District's plan honors the state's recommendations to have younger students in class as much as possible, and it recognizes that secondary level students are more equipped to be self-sufficient in e-learning, so there will not be as much of a time commitment from parents to assist with e-learning.</p> <p>Students and staff in grades K-3 will be in their home schools every every day at the same times as in past years.</p> <p>Students in grades 4-5 will be relocated to the high school building and will be assigned rooms throughout the school. Students in those grades from all elementary schools will be at the high school for four days per week. One day per week, Wednesday, will be virtual. Their starting time will be roughly 8:00-8:10 a.m.</p> <p>Students in grades 6-8 will remain in their respective middle schools, with half of the students coming in two designated days each week and alternating with the other half of the student body for two opposite days. One day per week, Wednesday, will be virtual for all, with opportunities for individual students to access assistance and support. Middle school times will remain the same as in past years.</p> <p>Students in grades 9-12 will be virtual for four days per week. One day per week, Wednesday, students may come to Minnetonka High School for MAST and for some in-building classes with elements that cannot be easily done at home (such as labs, MOMENTUM, Minnetonka Research, VANTAGE and more). There will also be other help sessions and opportunities to meet in person or virtually with counselors and social workers.</p> <p>In all grades, the District will honor IEPs and 504s, and provide additional support for our students who receive special education services and for other students who need a higher level of support.</p> <p>Social distancing will be enforced at all times in our school buildings, and masks will be required for everyone, unless the student or staff member meets an exemption requirement.</p>	High school students begin September 8, Grades K-8 begin September 10	LINK
Mounds View	Distance Learning	<p>In response to the concerns expressed by staff, students and families, we will open the school year using the distance learning model, instead of the blended (hybrid) learning model as originally planned. We want to take this time at the start of the school year to demonstrate that our plans meet or exceed the safety requirements from the Minnesota Department of Health and Minnesota Department of Education for the reopening of schools. "A" students will attend school on campus Monday, Wednesday and alternating Fridays. "B" students will attend school on campus Tuesday, Thursday and alternating Fridays. 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Osseo Public Schools	Distance Learning	<p>The first day of school for all students will be Monday, Sept. 14</p> <p>For the first two weeks of the school year (Sept 14-25), all students will be taught in the distance learning model (100% remote learning)</p> <p>On Monday, Sept. 28, all students (except those who are already enrolled in the Distance Learning Academy) will transition to the hybrid model, which means: Group A students will attend school in person on Monday and Wednesday, and do remote learning on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. We will dismiss elementary schools approximately one hour early to allow time for teachers to connect with students who are not in person. Dismissals may be staggered based on bus routing. Wherever possible, PreK - grade 5 students will remain with the same students throughout the school day to increase safety of our students and staff. <p>Most secondary students (grades 6 - 12) will participate in distance learning five days per week. This includes both Hybrid and Shakopee Online students. September 8th and 9th will be used for Connect and Assess activities in grades K-5.</p> <p>Our secondary students, grades 6-12, will start on Tuesday, September 8th.</p> <p>Secondary school days will also be shortened by 30 minutes. East and West middle schools will now start at 7:45am and end at 1:55pm. The high school will start at 8:20am and end at 2:30pm. Tokata Learning Center hours are unchanged. This plan is in alignment with Minnesota's Safe Learning Plan for the 2020-21 School Year.</p> <p>Part of this plan includes pushing back the first day of school to Thursday, September 10, 2020. Teaching staff return on August 31 and this change provides two additional days of professional learning and planning necessary to support their work with students. This is based on current COVID-19 cases within the counties that SANB resides within. We are still giving families the option for full-time distance learning if they choose/need for health and medical reasons.</p> <p>Hybrid learning will consist of a staggered in-person and distance learning model. This means there will be days where K-12 students will be meeting in-person at each building, and other days where distance learning will take place.</p> <p>A hybrid model could range from students attending two days a week, one day a week, or even some students attending school in-person, while others do not. Hybrid learning could range from a modified hybrid model (less students in a building) to a more robust hybrid model with up to 25-50% of students in a building. DEFINITIONS for this chart:

IN-PERSON: In-person learning for all students. In this planning scenario, schools should create as much space between students and teachers as is feasible during the day, but will not be held strictly to enforcing six feet of social distancing during primary instructional time in the classroom.

HYBRID: Hybrid learning with strict social distancing and capacity limits. In this planning scenario, schools must limit the overall number of people in school facilities and on transportation vehicles to 50% maximum occupancy. Sufficient social distancing with at least six feet between people must occur at all times.

DISTANCE LEARNING: Distance learning only. Students receive instruction off-school sites, but schools may also be open to provide emergency child care or other functions. The format of distance learning will be modified with improvements from what was learned spring 2020.
